





















Ulistac Checklist

Can you find all the things on the list at Ulistac? Check them off when you spot them!

 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Turkey Vulture</u></p> <p>Turkey Vultures are nature's garbage disposal – they eat roadkill and carcasses left behind by other animals. Look up in the sky, can you see them soaring high above?</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>California Poppy</u></p> <p>This is California's State flower. They can be seen flowering at Ulistac in spring and early summer.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Lizard</u></p> <p>We have two types of lizard living at Ulistac. Pictured is the more common Fence Lizard. If you are lucky, you may see an Alligator Lizard!</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Listen to a Mockingbird sing</u></p> <p>Mockingbirds like to copy other sounds. Their songs are a chain of little songs put together. Mockingbirds at Ulistac have been known to copy car alarms and tree frogs!</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Flannel Bush</u> *Look, don't touch!*</p> <p>There are several large Flannel Bushes in Ulistac. In spring they are covered with many yellow flowers. Tiny hairs on the plant can make your skin itch.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Say 'hi' to a volunteer</u></p> <p>Most of the work at Ulistac is done by volunteers. If you see someone working, say hi! You can also ask them any questions you may have.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Scrub Jay</u></p> <p>Scrub Jays are easy to spot at Ulistac because of their bright blue colour. They can also be noisy! In the fall, they store acorns for use over winter.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Monarch Butterfly</u></p> <p>We have been planting lots of milkweed at Ulistac for the caterpillars to eat. Look out for the bright orange butterflies, and the stripey caterpillars.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Anna's Hummingbird</u></p> <p>This tiny bird can often be seen feeding on the nectar of flowering plants. That's not all they eat though – hummingbirds also eat insects!</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Snail</u></p> <p>The majority of snails found at Ulistac have white shells like this one. Sometimes you will see groups of them on fence posts.</p> <div style="text-align: right;"><input type="checkbox"/></div>

When at Ulistac, remember – take only photographs and leave only footprints.

 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Hawk</u></p> <p>There are several hawk species that visit Ulistac including the Red-tailed Hawk, Red-shouldered Hawk and Cooper's Hawk. You may have to look in the sky to find them!</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Smell some Sage</u></p> <p>We have several varieties of sage at Ulistac, including White Sage, which is a sacred plant for many Native American People. Smell the leaves but please don't pick them.</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Jackrabbit</u></p> <p>Jackrabbits are actually hares, not rabbits. They have very long ears. They can run at speeds up to 45mph! They are quite shy, so it may be hard to find one.</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Swallowtail Butterfly</u></p> <p>Both the Anise and the Tiger Swallowtail are large with yellow and black markings. They visit Ulistac regularly during the warmer months.</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Poison Oak</u> *Look, don't touch!*</p> <p><i>"Leaves of three, leave them be".</i> Poison oak usually has groups of three shiny leaves. Make sure you don't touch it, the plant can cause a nasty rash.</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Ladybug</u></p> <p>You will have to look carefully to find this tiny creature! Did you know that not all ladybugs have spots? Some have stripes!</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Squirrel</u></p> <p>We have three species of squirrel living at Ulistac; Eastern Gray, California Ground, and Fox Squirrels. In the fall, squirrels will collect acorns from the Oak Trees and store them for use over winter.</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Find the creek</u></p> <p>We have a man-made creek at Ulistac, can you find it? It is only run for three times a week. The creek is run using recycled water, so do not drink it or play in it!</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Toyon</u></p> <p>Toyon is also known as a Holly Berry or Christmas Berry. It has dark green leaves that stay on the tree all year. The plant has clusters of white flowers in early summer and red berries in winter.</p>	 <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Watch a bee feeding</u></p> <p>Lots of bees visit Ulistac, including several species of native bee. In the spring our plants are often buzzing with bees. If you stand quietly, you can watch them feed. They will only sting if they feel threatened.</p>

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
